Monday January 8th, 2018 – Jenny Barlow – Quilts and More

We are delighted to welcome Jenny Barlow to our January meeting.

As the daughter of a tailor and pattern cutter Jenny Barlow become acquainted with the sewing world at the tender age of three. Jenny's love for sewing didn't diminish as the years progressed and her passion for quilting began in 1979. Since then she has enjoyed the tutelage of many experienced and qualified teachers, learning a wide variety of skills, including the sewing machine and hand stitching.



A taster of February's workshop



Monday 5th February, 2018 – Ferret – Quilter, Artist, Lunatic.

Ferret is an astoundingly versatile quilter and textile artist. Her work ranges from traditional pieced to avant-garde applique. Her subjects include everything from dragsters and rock stars to comic books and kitty cats. She works in cotton and leather and is always tripping the boundaries. Ferret: I purchased my longarm machine because I love patchwork, and I was making more tops than I could guilt on a domestic machine. It was a drastic step, but it has helped me keep on top of finishing my quilts. I do the guilting on an ABM Innova System, using all cotton threads. Most of my threads are either Superior or Signature in solid or variegated.

Quilters Guild region 3 Area Day Saturday 8th October by Chris Noyes

The meeting was held at Littleton Millennium hall, near Winchester. The venue, a new one for the guild, was a very pleasant modern hall, and the meeting was well attended.

The morning speaker was Maria Thomas, who calls herself an alternative quilter. She uses everyday objects that have a special meaning for her- food wrappers, labels, packaging that are stitched and absorbed into the fabric by patchwork and quilting techniques. She talked about her family life and how it relates to her work, and she showed us some amazing quilts and beautifully crafted jackets that she had made.



The afternoon guilter was Julia Gahagan, who specialised in miniature guilts, mostly of pictorial themes - village scenes, seaside, snow etc. These looked extremely intricate but, in fact, she showed us how simple they were to do. She cuts out the shapes and attaches them to the background with a dab of glue. When the picture is complete she covers it with net and then guilts all over the top, and so securing everything in place. We were amazed at the amount of beautiful work she had to show us and the talk was most enjoyable, as I am sure the workshop was too, that she was hosting the next day. The area day made a lovely day out for quilters and it is very pleasant to meet up and make friends with members of other groups in the region.
