Answer to Question of the Month

Crazy Quilting; you don't have to be crazy to make this style of quilt! The word "crazy" comes from the crazed patterns seen in cracked pottery glaze. These quilts use satins, silks & velvets. As well as being pieced together from luxurious fabric, each seam is richly embroidered with stitches such as herringbone, blanket stitch & lazy daisy in coloured threads. The overall effect is one of Victorian opulence.
