1718 Quilt



To celebrate its 300th anniversary, the oldest dated patchwork coverlet in Britain has been displayed at the American Museum Bath and the NEC Birmingham. Mary Hewson, our President, has conducted historical research on behalf of the Quilters Guild who purchased it in 2000, but has not been able to identify the maker. It was a family heirloom of a rich farming family: Brown of Aldbourne, Wilts and has E.H. 1718 surrounded by hearts and figures of a man and woman. It is composed of 120 different silk dress fabrics (some had gold thread and one dates to 1640) in 182 blocks pieced over paper templates and backed by linen. It would have had a border too.

The blocks are mostly 4 inches with geometric shapes, bell shaped flowers, bells and some animals: geese, a cat, dog, swan, deer, pheasant, butterfly, lion and unicorn. The latter are the heraldic arms of James I suggesting royalist support (together with the Fleur de Lys) and the bells may allude to a bell foundry in Aldbourne. As the quilt is faded and worn, Pauline Adams in 2004 organised a replica project aided by Susan Briscoe who published 69 quilt blocks from the design in order that the original could be better preserved away from view.

The coverlet measures 66.5×73 ins. - would fit a double bed
